Message from the Principal

Some exciting developments with our new Rosebud campus project have occurred recently. We had a ceremonial 'sod turning' event which was well attended by staff, committee members, our local MP Chris Brayne and Councillor Antonella Celi.







Construction has commenced and should be completed by the end of the year, ready for the class of 2022. The building will be a two storey, purpose built, state-of-the-art facility which will double our current capacity. Copy of the plans are on display at the current Rosebud Campus.

I am pleased to see the uptake of Vocational Training as part of our VCAL delivery has increased to a more diverse range of qualifications and training organisations. Two of our students have also been successful in applying to the Caroline Chisholm Education Foundation for their VET funding. Our thanks to the CCEF for their support.

It is pleasing also to note that student enrolments at all three College campuses are at capacity. With a growing waiting list for all campuses, it is important that all students attend regularly. Students who do not attend regularly are making it difficult for themselves by not keeping up and having to do catch up work, and, as a worst case scenario risk losing their place at the College. Work experience is part of a schools' educational program where students experience working life, often for the first time. It is the short term placement of secondary school students with host employers, to provide insights into the industry, and

the workplace in which they are located. Students are placed with employers primarily to observe and learn – not to undertake activities which require extensive training or expertise. It is undertaken at the employer's premises and has enormous benefits for students as it gives them a chance to:

- Work alongside adults as part of a team gaining an understanding of work
- Develop and practice a range of new skills
- Become more independent and confident
- Relate the school curriculum to the workplace
- Increase motivation to continue their study and/or undertake further training
- Explore career options

Cyber safety


The internet can be a positive way for teens to connect socially and access information, but can also have negative emotional impacts that we need to be aware of. The e-safety commissioner has published findings that 44% of young people surveyed had a negative experience online - which included being *contacted by a stranger, receiving unwanted content, or social exclusion*. https://www.esafety.gov.au/about-us/research/digital-lives-aussie-teens.

Peninsula Pride provides support to young people in both the Frankston and the Mornington Peninsula regions.

Pride in Ourselves

Social groups and activities and events allow young people to meet others with similar lived experience. Young people are divided into two different age groups: 12yrs up to 18yrs and 18yrs up to 25yrs. New young people are introduced into Peninsula Pride 4x a year. There are no fees for young people. Places are limited. Young people interested in participating in Peninsula Pride groups or activities need to contact the headspace Frankston Intake Team.
